Facts:

From 1969-92, Honeywell and its predecessors delivered a highly toxic solvent, trichloroethylene (TCE), to deft Lockformer Company in Lisle. As TCE was pumped into a rooftop tank, it overflowed onto the ground. The Honeywell truck also leaked TCE onto the ground. Material Safety Data sheets Honeywell provided to its customers since 1983 confirmed that both Honeywell and Lockformer knew of the highly toxic nature of TCE and its potential to contaminate potable water supplies. In 1993, Lockformer sued Honeywell for spilling TCE onto its property. In 1994, Honeywell agreed to pay Lockformer \$800,000 for investigation and cleanup of the Lockformer facility. Terms of the settlement required Lockformer to refrain from discussing Honeywell's TCE releases or assisting anyone who might have a claim against Honeywell as a result of the releases. Cleanup did not begin until June 2003. Lockformer was expelled from the Illinois E.P.A.'s voluntary site remediation plan in 2002 for failure to promptly investigate the extent of the contamination. In 1997, the County of DuPage cited Lockformer for having open containers of TCE beneath its rooftop tank, despite Lockformer's position that there had been no spills since 1992. In 1997, the County of DuPage tested industrial discharge from Lockformer and found it contained impermissible amounts of TCE that were being discharged into sanitary sewer lines. Lockformer, despite knowledge of TCE releases on its property in 1985, waited until 1999 before disclosing releases to the community, including pltfs, even though it knew TCE had migrated off its property. Pltfs claimed that at a Village of Lisle board meeting in August 2000, Lockformer misled pltfs as to when it first discovered TCE spills and told pltfs that TCE

had not migrated off its property even though its own consultants and internal memos indicated otherwise. Pltfs claimed the market value of their properties was diminished by contamination found on Lockformer property as well as on at least one of the pltfs' properties. High levels of TCE were found within feet of the Papadopoulos and Kuta properties and actually on Frantiks' property. Defense denied contamination or impact on property values.

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
